A UNESCO World Heritage Site, Schönbrunn Palace is one of Vienna's most iconic landmarks. This Baroque masterpiece was the summer residence of the Habsburg emperors and empresses. Visitors can explore the opulent state rooms, stroll through the vast gardens with fountains and sculptures, and even visit the Tiergarten Schönbrunn, the oldest zoo in the world located on the palace grounds. The Hofburg Palace is the former imperial palace and a symbol of Austria's rich history. It served as the principal residence of the Habsburg dynasty and now houses several museums, including the Imperial Apartments, the Sisi Museum, and the Imperial Silver Collection. The Hofburg also hosts the Spanish Riding School and the Austrian National Library. Dominating Vienna's skyline, St. Stephen's Cathedral is a stunning example of Gothic architecture. Visitors can admire the intricate exterior with its colorful tiled roof and Gothic spires. Inside, the cathedral features beautiful stained glass windows, intricate altars, and the famous catacombs. The Belvedere Palace is a magnificent Baroque complex consisting of two palaces (Upper and Lower Belvedere) set in stunning gardens. It houses an impressive collection of Austrian art, including works by Gustav Klimt, Egon Schiele, and Oskar Kokoschka. The highlight is Klimt's famous painting "The Kiss" displayed in the Upper Belvedere. One of the leading opera houses in the world, the Vienna State Opera is renowned for its outstanding

performances and stunning architecture. Visitors can attend opera, ballet, and classical concerts in this historic venue, or take a guided tour to learn about its rich history and backstage operations. The Prater is Vienna's oldest amusement park, offering a mix of nostalgic rides, modern attractions, and green spaces. The highlight is the Giant Ferris Wheel (Riesenrad), which provides panoramic views of the city from its iconic red cabins.

Getting Around the City

Public Transportation: Getting around in Vienna is convenient and efficient thanks to the city's well-developed public transportation system, which includes trams, buses, the U-Bahn (subway), S-Bahn (commuter rail), and even ferries on the Danube River.

City Bikes: Vienna offers a bike-sharing system called "Citybike Wien," with numerous stations located throughout the city center and surrounding districts. Visitors can rent bikes for short trips and return them to any station within the network.

Walking: Vienna is a pedestrian-friendly city, with many attractions, shops, and restaurants located within walking distance of each other. Exploring the city on foot allows visitors to appreciate its historic architecture, charming streets, and vibrant atmosphere.
